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#### DRAWING NIGH TO GOD

Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands, ye sinners; and purify your hearts, ye double minded. (James 4:7-8)

Not all desire to be close to God or to have Him close to them. This should be unthinkable to the true believer. Religion that does not treasure a close relationship with God is empty and dead. So, while James was chiding with those to whom he wrote, he addresses something that must be there if they are saved.

The reason that God is dreaded by the many is that He in His holiness exposes them in their sinfulness. The believer welcomes this exposure so that he might be assured that Christ has atoned for his sin. Painful is the realization, but sweet is the forgiveness given in Christ. The Israelites of old told Moses to get what they needed from the Lord, but not to let the Lord speak directly to them.

To draw nigh to God is not that we should flippantly come in a way that denies an awareness of His majesty, might and power. Just the opposite is true. Those coming to Him believe that He is and that includes all that is true about Him. But, come they must. There is no other to whom we might turn because we realize that He who is offended by our sins is the only one who can forgive. This He does, for all who come, through the suffering and death of Christ.

That "He will draw nigh to you," Is a precious promise, not a conditional response. Yet, in the experience of drawing near, we sense that He is doing the same. It is His

delight to show mercy and provide comfort. It is not an inconvenience to God, rather it is in keeping with His purpose. It would only follow that we must be seeking an identity with His purpose. We must not be as they of old of whom it was said that drew near with their lips, yet, their heart was far from Him.

If we would declare His works: But it is good for me to draw near to God: I have put my trust in the Lord GOD, that I may declare all thy works. (Psalms 73:28). Consider then the promise of success: The LORD is nigh unto all them that call upon him, to all that call upon him in truth. (Psalms 145:18). We have both motivation and authority to draw nigh: For the law made nothing perfect, but the bringing in of a better hope did; by the which we draw nigh unto God. (Hebrews 7:19). Christ is the better hope. All believers are made nigh by the blood of His cross.

Sometimes, there is a hesitancy to draw nigh because we lack confidence to do so. Thus, we are reminded: Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water. (Hebrews 10:22). A better hope, full assurance, what better encouragement could we find? Why should we want to draw nigh to God? He has manifested over and over that those who love Him, He loved first. His design is to obtain glory by showing mercy. He will

have fellowship with His people. He will nurture them; He will give them peace and comfort and assurance. He will make His power known in them. He will engage His power for them. To the delight of such who seek Him, He will draw nigh to them.

This passage has some hard words for those to whom it was addressed. A closer look will reveal that the tendencies of the natural man are clearly in view. It is not the purpose of God to simply chide with us, rather, as a loving father he will graciously direct His children. There are three things that connect here. Looking at verse 7, we see that we are to submit ourselves to God, to resist the devil, and then to draw nigh to God. These are inseparable. Without humility and submission, man goes on seeking his own way. But, while we are told to submit to God, we are encouraged to resist the devil with the assurance that he will flee from you. This is not because of vou, but because of Christ in you. And thus, the groundwork is laid for drawing nigh to God.

It would be foolish to think that any of this could be accomplished apart from the mystery of God's enabling grace. Yet, as we are bidden so must we do. Remember that God "giveth grace unto the humble." Likewise, we dare not come presuming anything about approaching a Holy God. This is why He speaks of clean hands and a pure heart. Those drawing nigh would not do so with the matter of presumptive sin hanging over them. Above all else, we remember that God is HOLY. So are we directed, "be ye holy." Obviously, we cannot make ourselves holy. But again, we are directed to the blood of Christ which cleanses

us from all sin. Thus, we see the necessity of God given faith as essential to access. What of a pure heart? Earlier, James had said, Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lusts. (James 4:3). In our approach to God, we would be single eyed. That is, our focus would be upon His glory and our delight in it. Knowing the nearness of God is a wonderfully spiritual experience. It is not to be enjoyed in the context of carnality. We may as well expect a loving mother to punish a child by giving it ice cream as that God would engage us in His fellowship in the context of presumption and sin.

While these conditions may seem to be legalistic requirements, they are far from it. Having these issues resolved is a source of joy in and of itself. Truly, we could not enjoy having God nigh with such things unresolved. It is well said that unregenerate sinners would be miserable in heaven because there is nothing there they would enjoy. Likewise, we, in seeking a close walk with God, would have it to be free of all human distraction. These admonitions are graciously given that we might know the fullness of joy. This is not in the cold assent of the mind but in the warm response of a new heart.

To wit, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself... (2 Corinthians 5:19). The way of closeness then is found in Christ our Lord. It is He, who, through His death, burial, and resurrection has brought us nigh to God and God nigh to us. May we pray for deliverance from all that would hinder such tender love and fellowship with our Heavenly Father. bhs

Moreover, it will ultimately lead you home to heaven, to the very throne of God. No pursuit in life even begins to compare to this journey of following Jesus. –Steven Lawson, *The Cost*
